BARNES FAMILY HOLDS PICNIC

Review Pioneer Days at Butler's Mill.

Elder J. M. Barnes Presides

Over Seven Hundred People Enjoy Day.

Interesting Incidents of Early Settlers
Along Pintlala Creek Recounted To Hold Picnic Next Year.

Picnicking on the picturesque site of the old Butler's
Mill, the descendants of the pioneer families about Sprague—
Junction reviewed the history of the past, and enjoyed the
day making acquaintance with relatives, examining original
parchment land grants, and delving into the old time history
of the section of the state.

The picnic was held on the banks of the Pintlala Creek, nineteen miles from Montgomery and two and a half miles from Sprague Junction. Heralded as a reunion of the Barnes family and of the descendants of pioneer settlers, fully 750 persons were present at the celebration over which Elder Justus M. Barnes presided. Included in the number were probably fifty negroes, three of whom were between the ages of 80 and 90, and who were slaves of the pioneers

Mr. Barnes presided at both the morning and afternoon sessions. The morning session was opened by singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," followed by a short prayer. Mr. Barnes then explained the purpose of the meeting as being the bringing together of the descendants and friends of the early settlers on the ground first occupied during the early history of Alabama and to discuss their history.

Mr. Barnes then asked that all of the descendants of Walter Boyd, Thomas Boyd, Mrs. Anne Barnes, and Thomas Lumpkin to stand - apart in groups. The separating of the descendants of these settlers occasioned much merriment, but when finally completed it was found that there were eighty-six descendants of Walter Boyd present, while the three other families had just thirty-six representatives present.

It was explained to the several groups that the purpose of the picnic was the collection of family records and histories, and to further this end the following committees were named: the Walter Boyd family, W.W. Sellers, William Sellers, Walter Boyd, George Boyd, and Miss Augusta Ekwurzel; the Thomas Boyd family, Hubbard Bell, Walter Bell, Billy Boyd, Colon Bedsole, Leon Anderson and Sadie Bell; the Barnes family, Ellie Barnes,

William Luckey, Elkanah Luckey, Elisha Talley, Mrs. F.M. - Kirkpatrick, and Mrs. Paul Davidson; the Thomas Lumpkin family, Dr. M.B. Kirkpatrick, Dr. S.E. Jordan, Justus Jordan, Claude Mizell, Mrs. Ella Mizell and Miss Mary Barnes.

A letter from S.L. Arrington of Rock Mountain, S.C., who is the present owner of the plantation upon which the picnic was held, was read to the assembly in which permission was given for the old mill rock, used for half a century, be placed upon the grave of Thomas Butler, founder of the mill, and whose remains lie upon the hill just south of the picnic grounds.

Mr. Barnes made a formal address during the afternoon, giving reminiscences about the old family and the relationships, exhibiting family trees, Bibles, and parchment deeds, and othersouvenirs of pioneer days. He narrated many interesting incidents of the Pintlala settlement, telling of the old race course, the activity of the old mill, of the groggery shop and the fights (?) which were pulled off near the race track.

Reassembling after dinner it was voted to have a similar picnic on the last Thursday of next August, and to this end the following committee on arrangements was appointed: Squire Walter Boyd, chairman; Walter R. Watson, Fayette Duncan, Wm. Sellers, W.T. Norman, Colon Bedsole and Claude Mizell.

Dr. Thomas M. Owen followed with a talk on the value of historical research and the importance of studying the lives of the pioneers, closing with a compliment to Mr. Barnes. John Elmore also complimented Mr. Barnes, saying that if the old pioneers could look down upon the present generation they would be proud of the standing of their descendants.

The day was closed with a prayer by Dr. S.E. Jordan of Mountain Home.

Among the prominent families represented were: The Talleys, Kirkpatricks, Carneys, Tankersleys, Moores, Carrs, Sharps, Staceys, Pools, Robertsons, Shackelfords, Moseleys, Butlers, Lumpkins, Boyds, Barnes. The visitors included W.T. Seibels, Judge M.H. Screws, J.A. Elmore, Tom Peach, W.T. Norman, Dr. S.E. Jordan, Elisha Talley, W.J. Orum, Bob Taylor, Dr. Robert Shackelford, Dr. Thos. M. Owen.

OUR PIONEER ANCESTORS

WILLIAM CALVIN SELLERS and his wives LAVINIA ANDERSON AND MARIAH ADELINE TROTTER

William Calvin Sellers was born in North Carolina sometime between 1794 and 1800. His parents were William and Rebecca Sellers. (see NOTE 1 below) William and Rebecca and their family spent time in Lexington District and Marlboro Co. SC before migrating further south. This family arrived in Jefferson Co. GA before 1818 where the marriage records show that William Calvin and his brother Alfred married Lavinia and Elizabeth Anderson in a double wedding on December 2, 1818. These women were two of the daughters of Elisha and Lavinia Brack Anderson.

The Sellers family appears in the 1820 Jefferson Co. GA census records as "William Cellers," "William C. Cellers" and "Alford Cellers" An unnamed male age 16-26 was in the "William Cellers" household and is presumed to be the third son Major Holcomb. The chance of acquiring free land through the Georgia Land Lottery attracted settlers as Indian lands were opened for occupation in Central and Western parts of Georgia. William Sellers drew a lot of land in Appling Co. GA in the 1820 lottery and received a state land grant of 200 acres in Jefferson County in 1824. Alfred also was a lucky winner in 1820. William Calvin and M. Halcomb drew land in 1821 so this family was quite fortunate to acquire several land lots in the lotteries.

William Calvin and his wife Lavinia and Alfred and his wife Elizabeth were among those who came to Alabama from Jefferson Co. GA in the late 1820s. including the Sellers, Andersons, Shepherds, Bonhams and others in this extended family. William Calvin's mother Rebecca accompanied her sons to Alabama. We have no information concerning the death of the father William but since Rebecca was shown as head of household in the 1830 Lowndes Co. census record it is presumed that he was deceased at that time. William Calvin was the original owner of record of a tract of land in Lowndes Co. west of Pintlala which he acquired on 2 Feb 1829,

William Calvin, Alfred and Elizabeth were received into membership of Bethel Church at Pintlala 'by experience" in 1827, William Calvin being dismissed by letter in 1833. His wife, Lavinia, does not appear in Bethel records. They continued to reside in the Eastern side of Lowndes Co. The children born to them were as follows:

James Anderson b 1819 GA. married Harriet Trotter; lived at Fleta Elizabeth b 1820 GA, married Eaton Walton Rebecca L.b 1822 GA, married 1.Henry Melton, 2. Joseph C Stockard William C. b 1825 GA married Rebecca Owens; lived in Ft. Deposit

Lavinia J. b 1827 AL married Seaborne Anderson

Anderson M. b 1829, Lowndes Co. AL married 1. Martha Boyd, 2. Georgia Bussey; lived at Sellers.

Frances Ann b AL married John M Butler; lived in Selma, Dallas Co. AL Major Holcomb died young Mary died young

Lavinia Anderson Sellers died in 1843. On 15 April 1845 William Calvin married his second wife, Mariah Adeline Trotter, daughter of Joseph and Martha Trotter of Russell Co. AL and sister of James A. Sellers' wife Harriet. The mother of Mariah and Harriet - Martha Trotter - is buried at Mt Carmel and is one of the earliest born persons interred there. Two children were born to William Calvin and Mariah:

Arenza b.1846 married Jesse C. Matthews.

Thomas Jefferson b 1848 married Martha Letitia Bonham; lived at Mt. Carmel (See NOTE

2)

William Calvin Sellers died intestate in Lowndes Co. AL in 1848. Family lore places his burial place as Concord Cemetery which is located behind the Sylvest Chicken Farm in Lowndes Co., west of Pintlala. No marker was found but this long neglected cemetery was obviously very large. It is likely that his wife, Lavinia and his mother Rebecca were also interred there.

His eldest son James A. Sellers was the administrator of his estate and his reports to the court are available in Lowndes County Estate Papers at the Alabama Archives. In keeping with the law Mariah was awarded her widow's dower in the real property. All the personal property of the estate was sold at auction and the proceeds divided among the heirs. Bills submitted to the administrator included bills for \$10.00 and \$8.00 from Mr. John C. Parmer for the coffins he made for Mr. Sellers on August 19, 1848 and his daughter Mary on September 28, 1848.

The land owned by William Calvin at his death included about 250 acres in Lowndes Co. and about 150 acres in south Montgomery Co. northeast of Bethlehem. The original owner of record of part of the Montgomery Co. property was Elijah Shepherd, a nephew of William Calvin's first wife. The remainder had originally been owned by John Simmons. We do not know whether it was acquired from them or from interim owners nor do we know what disposition was made of the property in the settlement of the estate. Montgomery deed records might provide this information.

The 1850 Montgomery Co. census records indicate that James and Harriet Sellers provided a home for Mariah and her two children as well as James' younger brothers, Anderson M. and Major Holcomb. In 1850 Mariah married Samuel F. Johnston - a Methodist Protestant minister. Samuel had children from a previous marriage and at least two sons were born to them mostly referred to as Doc (H.P.) and Dude (D.H.) Johnston. After Rev. Samuel Johnston died in 1877 Mariah made her home with one of these sons near Sellers until her death in 1913. Samuel and Mariah are both buried at Mt. Carmel.

(NOTE 1) William Calvin's father William is most likely the Son of Revolutionary War soldier Elisha Sellers of Brunswick Co. North Carolina and his first wife and is probably the William mentioned in Elisha's 1801 will. No documents have been located which will prove this relationship but a thorough search of existing records fails to show any other identification for William. William Calvin Sellers has a name-sake among the descendants of Pike Co. pioneer Samuel Sellers who was a proven son of Elisha Sellers indicating a probable family relationship.

(NOTE 2) Ronald E. Sellers, Sr was the youngest son of Thomas Jefferson Sellers. Research into this lineage was a genealogical challenge. Thomas Jefferson was born when his father William Calvin was about 50 years old and Ronald was born when Thomas J. was nearly fifty, making only two generations in 100 years. One would ordinarily expect at least 3 or perhaps 4 generations in such a time span and we expended a great deal of effort searching for non-existent ancestors in this line before finding the documents needed to prove the relationships. The research was further complicated by erroneous information which has been published about this family.

SHARP OR SHARPE CEMETERY

Recorded January 30, 1982 by J.J. and Laurie Sanders

Located in Montgomery County, Alabama - off the Hayneville Road (between Highway 31 (sic) 331? and Butler Mill Rd.) (West of Legrand) Turn off Highway 31 (331?) in front of Mosley's Store near Providence Presbyterian Church - go about 1½ miles on Hayneville Road (toward Butler Mill Rd.) Turn left about .2 mile past Franklin Road at a Lane-type road leading to 2 cemeteries - Sharp is 2nd cemetery.
