PLANS ARE NEARING COMPLETION FOR COUNTY TELEPHONE PROJECT

Plans are being made by the Montgomery County telephone project to incorporate and meet other requirements for the \$125,000 loan approved by the Rural Electrification Administration as announced on March 25.

State Sen. Vaughn Hill Robison will be the cooperative's attorney. Senator Robison is handling the details for incorporation, clearance with the Alabama Public Service Commission, secretary of state, etc.

Meanwhile, at a meeting of the board of directors on March 30, plans were mapped for getting the required number of subscribers. Briefly, the subscriber requirements are this: the loan will become available when the cooperative has 225 subscribers with deposits of \$10, when that number has been enrolled, the application can be made for funds to begin the engineering survey. A total of 309 subscribers must be enrolled before the line is completed, but work can be started with only the 225 enrollments. Memberships in the co-operative will be \$50.

Those who are already subscribers, and have paid a deposit of \$5, will be asked to pay another \$5 now and the remaining \$40 when the phone is ready to be installed in the house. New subscribers now will pay \$10 and the remaining \$40 on installation of their phones.

PW Williams of Ramer was the first volunteer to offer help with the canvass of members for the additional deposits. He has already broughs in a substantial number. Others are asked to volunteer in order that the required work may be done by May 1.

As soon as requirements have been met, a meeting will be held with representatives of Bell Telephone Company, the REA and the Public Service Commission to complete details for the release of funds for an engineering survey.

Every person in the proposed area interested in a phone is asked to contact one of the directors or the secretary, Mildred Smith.

The monthly rates, subject to approval of the Public Service Commission. For residence phones, the rates will be approximately as follows: \$4.50 for a private line; \$3.75 for a two-party line; and \$3 for a multiparty line. A private line for a business firm will be approximately \$6.50 per month.

ANOTHER STEP TAKEN TO OPEN NEW PHONE LINES IN COUNTY

The "Mon-Cre (Montgomery-Crenshaw) Telephone Co-operative, Inc.," filed a certificate of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of State last week and a certified copy has been sent the probate judge of Montgomery County.

Another copy will be sent the Rural Electrification Administration in Washington this week, along with copies of the constitution and by-laws, which are in process of being drafted by Sen. Vaughan Hill Robison, attorney for the co-operative, which was recently approved for a \$125,000 loan to build a telephone system.

Minutes of the first meeting of the directors in which Sen. Robison was chosen as the co-operative's legal counsel are also being drafted and will be sent the REA in Washington.

Negotiations have been entered to bond the officers and board of directors and a corporate seal has been ordered.

The articles of incorporation list W Gilbert Sellers Sr., Ramer, chairman; Charles W Stephens, Pine Level, vice-chairman; Mildred Smith, Ramer, RFD 1, secretary-treasurer; Ben Spear, LaPine, Farley Bright, Bradleyton, and the officers as members of the board.

Its Purpose

The co-operative was formed for the purpose of building a rural telephone system to serve families in the Southern part of Montgomery County and the Northern part of Crenshaw County not presently served by any other telephone system.
